HERITAGE PARK AND YOU



Using the Past to Look to the Future

Heritage Park brings to life the stories of the diverse people who shaped the unique heritage and development of Western Canada. The Park, a non-profit, charitable organization, is an anchor tourism destination in Calgary, the largest heritage classroom in Alberta with 50,000⁺ students and 500,000⁺ guests each year and one of the largest living history museums in Canada.

With the honour and responsibility to preserve, protect and promote the Canadian prairies' historical buildings and artifacts, the Park provides an engaging and immersive look at over 100 years of history. From traditional Indigenous practices to following a dream and establishing towns in challenging climates through the invention of typesetting, building the railroad, and discovering oil,

our visitors bear witness to some of the most significant gains made prior to 1950. These advances laid the foundation for inventions used every day in the 21st century. This progress didn't happen by chance. It was made by everyday people making courageous choices and taking risks. The Park hopes that by walking in the footsteps of these history makers, visitors are encouraged to make history too.

Your connection, commitment and generosity to Heritage Park makes this preservation of the past possible.

Together, we are creating a place where visitors discover meaning in the past that is still relevant today—and we hope inspires curiosity and wonder for the future.

HERITAGE PARK AS COMMUNITY BUILDER

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eeing how much our community values Heritage Park as a gathering place drives the Park's desire to take a more active role as a community builder. The Park needs to represent - and speak to - each person who visits. Therefore, it is our intent to magnify the voices of those who have not, until now, had their stories woven into the rich tapestry of our collective past.

Indigenous Engagement and Reconciliation

Through donor sponsorship, the Park presented the play *New Blood: A Story of Reconciliation* on National Indigenous Day. The play, developed and performed by Strathmore High School students, including youth from the neighbouring Siksika Nation, features poetry, music, and contemporary and traditional dance, all scored to the songs of Peter Gabriel. The work was inspired by the life of Chief Vincent Yellow Old Woman and his experience as a child in residential school, how he reclaimed his way of life and became chief of his people. In August, we welcomed the Park's first Indigenous Engagement Advisor. Under her guidance, the Park will roll out an Indigenous strategy. In 2022, that began with a commemoration of National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. This internal event, laid the foundation for what will be a very special public event in 2023.

Heritage and Cultural Days of Celebration

Heritage and Cultural days of celebration at Heritage
Park provide opportunities for the Park to highlight and
appreciate the myriad of contributions made by the many
cultural communities making up Alberta. Canada Day
included line dancing, multicultural performances by
GlobalFest, children's crafts, an Indigenous drum and
dance performance and family games, which brought
history to life. Heritage Day included performances by
Ukrainian dancers on the Didsbury bandstand, while the
Brown Bear Drum and Dance group shared aspects of
their culture and a fun-filled dance in the Burn's Barn.
As well, there were free historic Calgary presentations
throughout the day.

Creating Access for All

The Park is for everyone, so we want to ensure that all visitors can get around the grounds easily, no matter their mobility challenges. With donor funding, the Park was able to build an accessible railcar, which will allow those using mobility aids to enjoy the Park's authentic steam train. As this is one of the Park's signature activities, we eagerly anticipate launching the railcar, complete with new accessible train stations, in 2023. This project is part of a larger accessibility strategy the Park is undertaking over the next few years.

Women Making History in Alberta Awards

In honour of the women who pioneered and paved the way for future generations, last year we launched the Park's inaugural Women Making History in Alberta Awards. Our first award recipients represent the best of achievement by women in Alberta who themselves will be remembered by generations to come. We look forward to honouring such women on an annual basis.



Cocktails and Corsets Fundraising Event

The Park's first fundraising event post-COVID welcomed more than 400 guests who enjoyed wonderful food, drink and fellowship in the Gasoline Alley Museum. A women's market provided opportunities for retail therapy, while drag star Carly York Jones brightened the evening with two fun shows and DJ Sonidef provided the musical backdrop for a little dancing. There were opportunities to learn about the history of corsets, with curators mingling through the crowd with unique artifacts asking guests what they thought they



2022 HERITAGE PARK WOMEN MAKING HISTORY IN ALBERTA AWARD RECIPIENTS

Cheryl Foggo - For more than three decades, Cheryl has dedicated her career as an award-winning author, documentary film director, screenwriter and playwright to sharing Black perspectives and stories from the Prairies, especially John Ware.

Dr Cora Voyageur - Cora has been a researcher, teacher and strong advocate for Indigenous people in Canada, for Indigenous women in particular. She deeply values education, both for herself and her students and is a full professor in the Department of Sociology at the University of Calgary, the first Indigenous woman to hold a tenured position there.

Teresa Woo-Paw - Teresa was the first Trustee and Chair of the Calgary Board of Education of Asian Canadian descent and the first female Member of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta and Cabinet Minister of Asian Canadian descent. She founded seven organizations and has served on more than 30 committees and boards at local, provincial and national levels.

Enchanted Evening at Carnivàle

Evoking the enchanting and sometimes mystical-feeling of travelling carnivals of yesteryear, Heritage Park introduced a new fundraiser and community event, Carnivàle. Commencing with the Enchanted Evening fundraising dinner, this sold-out exclusive event provided guests with remarkable food and drink, private shows from Cirque de Nuit, and time with the tattoo artist, caricature artist and fortune teller. Enchanted Evening guests were then led on to the Park by the Ringmaster to join Carnivale on the Park. Here guests enjoyed aerial acrobats, fire twirlers and performers, stilt-walkers, caricature artists, tattoo artists, belly dancers, human balloon performers, clowns and fortune tellers. Carnivale had micro-events at various locations to showcase the Park and engage visitors at every turn, from midway rides and games to live music, carnival-themed food and Le Cirque de la Nuit's grand finale show.

HERITAGE PARK AS MEMORY MAKER

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ne of the things we often hear from our guests is the memories they have made when they visited the Park. For some, they visited early in our history when they were children themselves and now they're bringing their own children—and sometimes grandchildren!—to the Park. Our events, both new and longstanding, provide a wonderful way to bring loved ones together and make new friends in a relaxed and enjoyable environment.

Day Out With Thomas

We were delighted to welcome back Day Out With Thomas to the Park, with an abbreviated four-day stay and fewer train departures allowing for COVID sanitation protocols. It was a sold-out affair, with 97 per cent of guests saying the event met or exceeded their expectations. A huge thanks to the 148 volunteers who helped make the event a great experience.



Railway Days

The double-header steam train fired up to the delight of a record setting crowd. Taking part over two-days in September, Railway days became the top attendance days of the year in 2022 helping bring special train-related activities like the Kid's Railway Challenge, model displays, turn table demonstrations, telegram and hooping demonstrations, and caboose rides to life.



Music in the Plaza

Every Wednesday in the summer, the Park hosts Music in the Plaza for free. While donations are accepted, this event is more about bringing the community together. The caliber of music is remarkable, with one act last summer attracting over a 1,000 people who picnicked, sat on lawn chairs and even danced in the warm summer evening.





Ghouls Night Out

Nearly 10,000 ghouls big and small—came to Heritage Park to enjoy the Addam's Family, Frankenstein and the Monster, duelling Fortune Tellers and ghostbusting over the three-day event. The magic show, crafts, pumpkin patch games and haunted house provided little goblins and witches with lots to do and see as they ran from house to house.

Once Upon a Christmas

This is one of the best year-end holiday events in Alberta. In 2022, with COVID ebbing away, adults and children alike loved the classic holiday enchantment and magic that Christmas past elicits. More than 30,000 guests came out to enjoy the historic houses decorated for the season, Santa, firepits, live and roaming entertainment, horse-drawn wagon rides and Kids Only store where children can independently pick out gifts for their family.

Christmas in Alberta

Hosted in partnership with the Rosebud Theatre and Dick and Lois Haskayne, Christmas in Alberta delighted guests for the 14th year. For many this special fundraising evening marks the beginning of the holiday season. And, what a way to begin! Rosebud provided theatrical and musical performances while Heritage Park out did itself with traditional Christmas treats as well as a beautiful backdrop for the evening.

Schools Were Back!

Now is the time to ensure youth get a rush of joy or a pause from stress. Now is the time to support them in trying new things, looking at the world a little differently, working collaboratively to solve a challenge and stepping into the footsteps of our history makers so they can make history themselves. Thanks to our donors, you helped Heritage Park maintain our reputation as a Grade A educator. In 2022, our school programs rebounded to Pre-COVID attendance and it was delightful to see classes back on the Park enjoying experiential learning while having a great time.

The Park features 30+ programs for Grades K-8, in science, social studies, math, art, and cross curricular options as well as home school programs, youth group sleepovers and a variety of immersive camps. From discovering the role the railroad played in bringing settlers to the West to learning about the initiative of the Famous 5, our youth programming provides lessons you can't get



from a textbook alone. Heritage Park has a responsibility to our community to offer these programs in such a way that as many youth as possible can take part. Because we intentionally set our youth programming fees low, seeking funding from the community to subsidize the cost, many youth groups in southern Alberta find the price very reasonable. And, for those schools with financially vulnerable students, Heritage Park offers 100 per cent subsidized programs and busing. At Heritage Park, we are working hard to ensure no one is left out—something we can only do thanks to support from community partners.

New Exhibits Delighted Guests

For guests of all ages, we opened new exhibits on the Park last year. On the heels of the opening, we welcomed the donor-driven exhibit, Nanton Livery Stable and Vintage Veterinary Exhibit. The Vintage Veterinary Exhibit Association—many of whom are current or retired veterinarians—led the community fundraising for this extremely popular exhibit, which opened on June 12. A volunteer interpreter provided on-site explanations and stories which helped make this exhibit a unanimous hit of the 2022 season for young and old alike.



Prospect Ridge continued to delight guests. The access to the area was steep though; therefore, in 2022, with the support of a grant, the Park transformed the access into a switchback so everyone can easily get to and enjoy the Coal Mine, Water Wheel and Warden's Cabin. Innovation Crossing, which opened to the public in 2022, connects visitors to Alberta's historic energy stories through industry expert videos, a digitized collection of artifacts and hands-on learning at the discovery carts. We celebrated the successful completion of the Natural Resources Area Capital Campaign with a special donor event on August 7.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The oldest artifact on the Park is the Tipi Ring in the Settlement.
- The Park serves 30,000 hotdogs in a year, many of them enjoyed at the Midway Treatery.
- School children taking part in the Wetlands program discovered the sidecrawlers had two cycles in 2022 instead of the typical one. They were also more colourful and bigger than normal.
- Telegraphers put in 1000 volunter hours demonstrating this lost art. If you missed it, be sure to catch it at Railway Days 2023.
- There are six bee hives on the Park, producing honey that is used in Selkirk (when available).
- Gasoline Alley Museum has more than 400 vintage signs related to gasoline and transportation.
- Engine 2024, one of the beloved steam engines, turned 80 years old in 2022.
